# Bar Readiness Diagnostic

- At the conclusion of the spring semester, all first year full time day (and 2L evening) students will take a Bar Readiness Diagnostic during the exam period.
- The Diagnostic is part of the law school's initiative to help students succeed on the bar exam.
- All 1L Day and 2L Evening students are required to participate
- Although this assessment will not affect your grades, it will be scored to give you preliminary information about whether you are on track for success on the bar exam.
- You do not need to study for this assessment. You should take the assessment seriously and use the results to focus your future study efforts. Academic advising will be available to help you make the best use of the results.

# LAW IN CONTEXT - Overview

- A complete legal education requires more than knowledge of legal rules and proficiency in legal skills. Law in Context courses are intended to provide the law student with the third element of a complete legal education: the ability to understand law in a variety of theoretical, social, historical, and philosophical contexts.

# American Legal History

This course provides an introduction to American legal history focusing on such topics as the roots of the U.S. Constitution, the conflicting views of the relationship between religion and government and the role of the Constitution in times of war.

# Comparative Law

An introduction to differences and similarities among the world's legal systems. Students will discuss the variety of possible solutions to fundamental legal problems in differing cultures and legal institutions. The class will consider the constitution, litigation, legislation, interpretation and enforcement of justice, and how the United States legal system compares to those of other federations, states and nations.

# Critical Legal Theory

An introduction to a range of critical approaches to theories of law, especially those that explore the relationship between law and race, gender, sexual orientation, political affiliation, and social class. The class examines these perspectives in different contexts, including judicial decision-making, legal representation, and legal education.

# Law and Economics

Development and critical examination of the economic approach to the analysis of law. Study of how laws affect and are caused by individuals' incentives and behavior, with inquiry into which social goals the laws are attempting to further and the extent the laws succeed at achieving intended and unintended effects.
